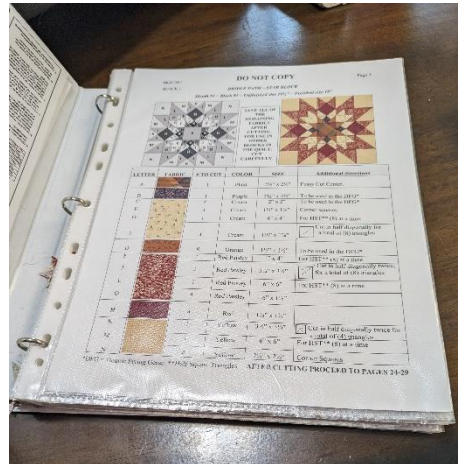
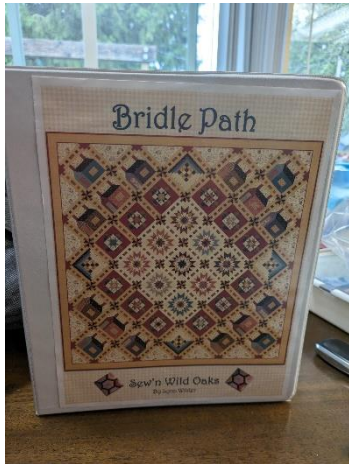


# Quilter's Corner at Ben Franklin

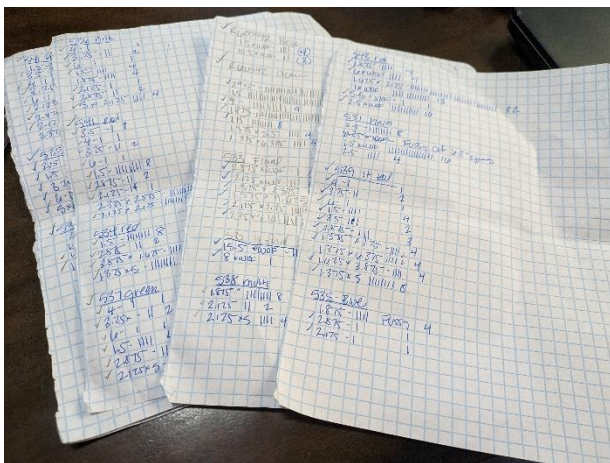
## Saturday Sampler 2024

Hi Bridle Path Friends,

I want to go over a few organization tips that I have as we start this quilt. If you have been with us for a while, we haven't done a quilt this intricate for a few years. I suggest keeping your pattern in a binder with page protectors (there are 44 pages!)



I like to pre-cut my whole quilt when there are so many different fabrics. I make a master list of cuts for each fabric from the pattern and then I can make all the cuts at once for each fabric. I use Ziploc bags to keep each block in and write the month and block name on it. After I am done cutting each fabric I place it in the bag that it belongs in and when its time to quilt I just pull that bag and I can sit down and sew rather than pull all of my fabrics out.



Here are some additional supplies that might be helpful.

Best Press or Flatter spray

Small iron and pressing mat

Stiletto

Mechanical pencil

Omnigridd 1/2 inch rulers

Creative grids flying geese ruler or Quilt in a day flying geese multi-pack



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
